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Bob Kinney--A GE Radio Enthusiast For More Than a Quarter Century!

When MRPD Region A Regional Manager Bob Kinney was in Lynchburg recently to attend the Regional Managers' meeting, the *News* had an opportunity to take note of his 25 years of service with the company and also to go back in time to the early days of our businesses while Bob reminisced about his early days with GE!

An Ohio native, Bob attended Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, N.Y., and got heavily involved in radio while in the military service during World War II when he helped put together an AM broadcasting station for the allied forces to use for propaganda purposes in Europe.

During this period Bob had planned a radio station with polycylindrical studios and AM and FM. When he returned to Youngstown, Ohio, after the war, he was asked by a judge in Akron, Ohio to build him a radio station in Warren, Ohio.

Bob took on this task, buying most of his equipment from General Electric, and GE asked him to write a paper on the radio station he had built. Following this, he was invited to come to work for GE selling AM, FM, and TV equipment.

"I looked upon GE with awe at that time," said Bob. "Naturally I was interested in selling GE equipment, and I was pleased that they wanted me to come to work for

them." Bob was hired after being interviewed by a panel of five people--a GE hiring practice in effect at that time--and went to work in Cleveland as a salesman, selling AM, FM, and TV. Soon after this--in the late 1940's--the FCC put a freeze on TV stations and at this point Bob decided that his future was in the field of mobile radio.

At this point in time there were many people prominent in GE's history--names like Chamberlain, Goosetree, Van Zile, Brandt--who offered him advice, pro and con, about mobile versus broadcast radio, but Bob stuck with Mobile and was given a territory covering a third of Ohio, including Columbus, Western Pennsylvania and West Virginia.

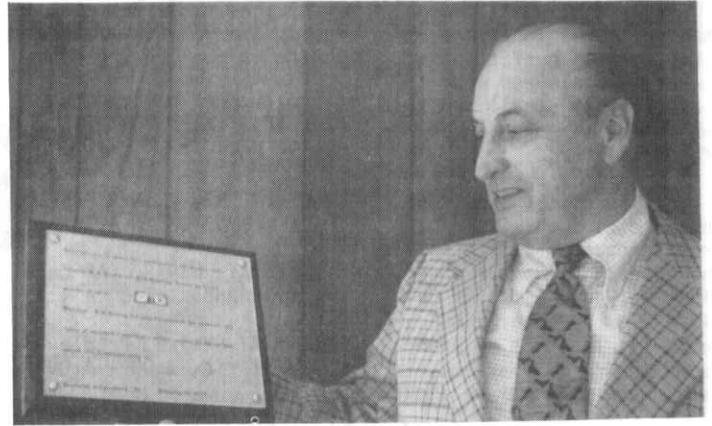
"The business really grew during this period," recalls Bob. "I knew all the chief engineers in TV and talked many of them into getting in the mobile business.

"One of the most exciting periods of my life was getting involved in the West Virginia market area. We got the utilities interested in mobile radio, and I designed a state-wide system for the West Virginia State Road Commission.

"Soon the business had gotten so big that the territory was split and I choose the Pittsburgh area. It was there that I sold the first big taxi system."

In 1955 Bob became manager of Military Sales in the Technical Products Department in Syracuse. Two of the contracts Bob sold were the Air Force five year exclusive contract and a development contract for a digital selective call service for the U.S. Air Force.

By the late 1950's this GE business--named the Com-

munication Products Department--had moved to Lynchburg, and the then General Manager, Harrison Van Aken, decided that Bob should receive the "Award of the Year" for his contributions to the business.

"I'll never forget being asked to come to Lynchburg... and being escorted to a dinner where I was the guest of honor," says Bob. "It was a thrilling experience. But when I received the award I knew that my accomplishments were due to teamwork on the part of others here at Lynchburg. I remember stating at the time that at least half of the award should have gone to Dave Pinkerton who had given so much support to the project....Dave, of course, is our business's PLCO manager

today."

Bob says he's been in Philadelphia ever since and that he's "never had a bad year."

Bob says that Region A and D was at one time a combination of Region A. Region A grew to a point that it became necessary to divide it into two regions, now Region A and Region D, which together total over \$23 million in sales.

Bob lives in Lansdale, Pa., 25 miles north of Philadelphia, and he and his wife have two married daughters and six grandchildren. They also have one son, a junior in pre-med at Ohio State, and a 12-year-old daughter, Colleen, at home.

Prices range from \$11.45 up to \$26.95 with most styles being in the \$14-\$20 range.

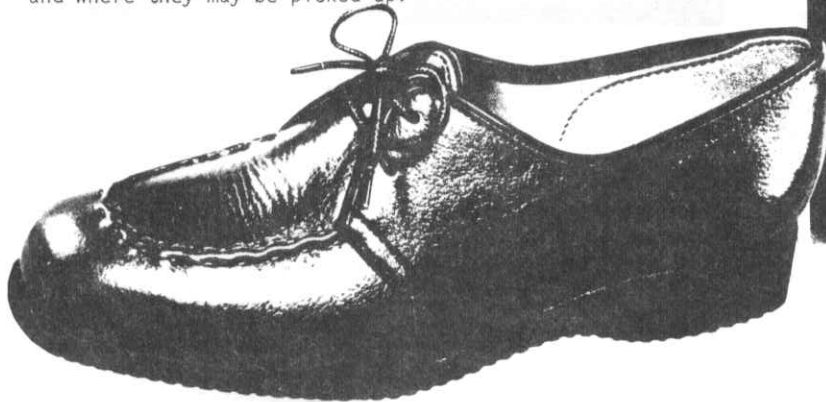
