### EGE celebrates \$110 million EDACS order

RLMR employees gathered around George Fath Thursday, June 30, as he announced to the local media that EGE received a \$110 million contract for a digital EDACS trunked radio system from the National Police of Taiwan.

The order is certainly cause for celebration — It's the largest for RLMR and is also regarded as the largest contract so far in the world for a digital trunked radio system.

The entire three-phase, three-year project will be manufactured in the Lynchburg facility. Production will begin by the end of 1994 and will include 83 EDACS sites, more than 500 MASTR III repeaters, more than 35,000 MPAs, 8,000 MDX mobiles, 3,000 desktops, and 155 consoles.

Craig Szczutkowski, Director Far East, Pacific and Latin America Operations, explains that it takes a lot of work to earn a contract of this magnitude. "The process actually began four or five years ago," he says, "when the customer realized he needed to upgrade his current communications system. We explained the features and advantages of our product, and at the same time our competitors did the same.

"We spent approximately a year to a year-and-a-half educating the customer as to what a trunking system could do for them and how to design an excellent system with the quality products and the networking capabilities that would meet their needs."

The customer distributed his bid specifications and solicited responses. Within three years, the National Police changed the bid date six

### RMOT ships 250,000th cellular phone

RMOT celebrated the shipment of the 250,000th cellular phone on Friday, June 24. Bengt Unden, Vice President Manufacturing, congratulated employees on their hard work. - New SMD equipment for both Radio Base Stations and phones
- More investments in automation of final assembly and test
- Continue with "friendly competition" with master plant in Gavle
- Implement overall change programs

## North cafeteria gets a facelift

The North cafeteria will be closed for remodeling starting 1 p.m. July 15. If everything goes smoothly, it will be reopened in late August, early September. The remodeled North cafeteria will feature three check out stations for faster service, a bright modern atmosphere, and more seating.

In order to lessen the inconvenience to employees during the remodeling, additional seating will be provided under canopies outside at both the North and South ends of the building — where the picnic tables are. In addition, the cafeteria will be grilling hot dogs and hamburgers outdoors.

The remodeling/rearrangement of food service in the facility will be done in phases. Here is a run down of what's happening:

#### Phase I

- July 14 to early September... North cafeteria remodeled
- July 17 30... Smoking room to be built in between CSC and MVR buildings. Entrance will be from the tunnel connecting the buildings.

#### Phase II

 Early September... North cafeteria reopens, South cafeteria to to be closed for remodeling. In the South cafeteria, vending service will remain; hot service will be discontinued; seating will be reduced; smoking room will be relocated to where the kitchen is currently located. There is already a strong exhaust fan vented to the roof for the smoking room.

#### Phase III

 Sometime 1995... Additional remodeling and new tables and chairs for the cafeterias (if the budget allows).

times based on new information and the influence of other competitors.

"Matra, a communications company in France, convinced the customer to choose a 100 percent digital solution because of their own product offerings. This allowed us to bid our AEGIS EDACS while eliminating Motorola from the competition" Craig explains.

On March 22, 1994, the customer solicited the sixth bid response from only two bidders, Ericsson GE and Matra. And as they say...The rest is history.

Many people helped bring in this order, including: Don McGhee, Technical Marketing Manager; David Lee and Ron Guthrie and the Proposal Development Team from the Asia/Pacific office; Marc Dissosway and John Yoon's team which developed the narrow band AEGIS product; and John Suzuki's and James Teel's teams which provided the networking ability using multisites, as well as Jessica for telephone interconnect requirements. In addition, this team is responsible for a Chinese display version of the consoles and system manager.

On the other side of the world Mats Olsson, Paul Mako Lee and Steve Chao and their team at Ericsson Radio Taiwan supported the proposal development, including extensive translation to Chinese.

Congratulations to all who had a hand in this monumental victory.
