25-Year Veteran Jay Bryant Reminisces on Fascinating History of General Electric's Mobile Radio Business

Normally a beehive of activity, the Mobile Radio
Business Section Field Operations Office paused for just a few moments the other day to reflect on the rich history and tradition of the Company's Mobile Radio Business--which can trace its origin back over several decades...but which only within the past year became a separate business section at CPD.

The occasion was the brief ceremony at which Jay Bryant, MRBS Regional Manager, in Region C, Tallahassee, Florida, was awarded his 25-year pin marking a quarter-century of service with the Company--every bit of which was in mobile radio.

HIRED BY D. LEE CHESNUT

It was in 1943 that Jay, a Missouri native, was interviewed and hired by D. Lee Chesnut and became the second man in the field for selling GE mobile radio... with a territory "from Ohio to Colorado and from Ontario to Texas."

Jay brought along the letter he wrote applying for the job 25 years ago. "This letter sounds so good, I believe I would have hired myself," quips Jay.

to write a good letter--with an AB degree from Missouri Valley College, Marshall, Mo., and a B.J. degree in Journalism and Advertising from the University of Missouri.)

Jay began his career in radio (but not GE radio) with a ham radio station in Jefferson City, Mo., and talked his way into a job--via radio-with the Missouri State Highway Patrol Police Radio located in the State Capitol building.

The eighth licensed broad-

cast station in the nation, this was state-owned Radio Station WOS, and, according to Jay, they played records and would interrupt the broadcast for police calls.

POTENTIAL FOR GROWTH SEEN

Jay saw the potential for growth in radio-both standard broadcast radio and mobile two-way radio-thus his decision to cast his lot with GE in 1943.

George Peterson in the Radio, Television and Electronics Division Sales office in Chicago, Jay faced the uphill battle of proving to potential customers that mobile radio really worked.

"At that time only police departments and electric util- Then, in 1946 Jay went to ities were licensed to use two-way radio...and then only for emergency," says Jay.
"For example, for awhile police were required by the FCC to use telephones rather than the units in their patrol cars for calling back to headquarters in anything other than an emergency situation."

PROVING THAT MOBILE RADIO REALLY WORKED

Jav also remembers some of the ordeals in connection with proving that mobile radio really worked.

"About the worst such experience I can remember was conducting some tests from the top of a grain elevator in Fargo, North Dakota," says Jay. "I had to climb the elevator and the temperature was 10 degrees below zero!"

Experiences such as this occurred mainly during the early 1940's when he served as a Technical Representative. the Electronics Department in Syracuse, where Dr. R. G. Baker was General Manager.

Jay went to Atlanta in 1949 as Southeastern Regional Manager for the Commercial and Government Equipment Division. The Communication Products Department was an outgrowth of this Division. Jay moved to Tailahassee in 1959 (by then CPD had its headquarters in Lynchburg).

BUSINESS PROSPECTS FOR MOBILE RADIO

Jay is enthusiastic indeed about the Mobile Radio Business Section's business prospects:

"We have a good, skillful, professional, well-trained field organization...to keep on getting our share of the business," says Jay.

"And," he adds, "we will certainly be successful in doing this provided we keep on getting the good engineering and quality of products that we've seen come out of CPD in recent years."
